(JC) Presentation from Recreation Commission for Open Space Projects

Charles DeGruccio spoke on behalf of the Recreation Commission. He informed Council that several members reviewed the parks in the town and there is need for a variety of repairs and upgrades.

Tennis and Basketball courts need to be resurfaced, and some form of paving needs to be done in front of the hut since it is always muddy.

JC reminded Council of the Letter of intent that is needed to be filed at this time (4/24) since the Borough is considering filing for an Open Space Grant-50% match by Borough Open Space Fund. The Letter of Intent is non-binding for the Borough.

Recreation's requests will be reviewed by the Finance Committee. Once something is decided, application can be made with award for 2019.

JC made a motion for Council to move forward with a Letter of Intent for Open Space grant.

Other discussions:

Jessica Greer-500 Lafayette Road

Concerns over the amount of litter in the town on main roads, railroad tracks and waterways. This is unacceptable for our community and she is tired of hearing that it is the County or Water Company problems. The Borough should be contacting the land owner to maintain their property to the standards that we all deserve.

She has spent quite a bit of time herself cleaning litter in the surrounding area of her home.

PAH stated that it would be quite helpful to call him directly or the Clerk's office and that would help expedite anything that may need to be done.

PAH noted that there are certain areas that the Borough cannot go on-it would be trespassing, he will try to find the contacts for the land owners and reach out to them.

It may not be a good excuse, but this past winter was rather rough and made it difficult for the DPW to get out and clean up the grounds, but he will make sure the DPW makes a concerted effort to clean up these areas as well as others around town. In the past there have been Green team clean-up and he could not believe how much junk is pulled out of the woods.

Richard Guerra-Laroche venue

Would like an official list of “hot-spots” to be addressed on a regular basis.
PA reminded all to contact him when they note an area of interest to be cleaned.
He will mention these locations to the DPW including the Police station bus stop area.

Michelle Mullikan-South Avenue

Embarrassed about the state of the empty lot in her neighborhood that is full of debris and never taken care of. Also upset about the stumps left from trees that have been cut down. Everywhere she looks there is debris, litter or the plants look like a mess (Library). The town logo should be changed since we are losing so many trees. Planning Board needs to take more care in their judgement when they allow construction in the municipality. The town of Harrington Park has become very sad.

Peter Ardito-Chair Environmental Commission

Rebutted that the Planning Board takes great care in providing the best decisions that are allowable under the law. There is a Tree Bank available to replace municipal trees, and plans in the works to have a lottery for residents to receive free replacement trees of decent caliper to replace roadside trees that have been lost or cut down. The Allegro project will have \$20,000.00 earmarked on the Tree Bank. Trees have recently been replaced on Highland Field, Don Horsey Park and Highland Road. Mr. Ardito is of the opinion that people should be allowed to do what they want on their property. Perhaps our current ordinances need to be reviewed and tightened up a bit. He will check with other towns and see what they do in this situation.

PAH added that Orange and Rockland talked to each homeowner along the path of their last project, and allowed the homeowner to decide if a tree should be cut down, or if they would like to keep it. The Beautification Committee has worked on planting through the town. The plantings on South Avenue were a small step in the right direction. The Tree Ordinance is in affect for construction projects, it is a very slippery slope on what you can or cannot allow your residents to do on their own property. PAH will check what liabilities are involved with the Borough.

Elise Schneider-South Avenue

She has had problems since her leaves were not picked up at the end of the winter and now she has had out the bags and not picked up. Received an email that you cannot use the bags but she has too much debris.

It was explained that only cans are to be used as per current contract.

ALB explained that an email was sent out twice, a reverse call, and Facebook s well.

DW reiterated the same

Discussion from residents regarding purchasing blue cans for recycling to help keep debris under wraps on windy days.

The cost is pricey and there are not any grants available for these receptacle.

JC stated this would be a consideration for the next contract

PAH stated that the Borough gets very frustrated as well, but he will make a concerted effort to ensure that the areas of interest are taken care of on a regular basis. Many of the areas are on property that the Borough cannot trespass on, however, he will reach out to his contact to request their property is properly maintained. He will reach out to the County regarding their properties as well as the roads that have been pot-hole ridden. The County does not allow our DPW to repair any the roadways.

Jessica Greer reminded all that cleaning up the current litter is not a one-time deal-there is a need for continual cleaning.

MaryAnn Schran-Greet Team Chair

In 2008 the Environmental Commission started with Beechwood Park clean up-which are now maintained mostly by Scouts. Sustainable Certification is ongoing and the Green Team has discussed requesting bringing back the Shade tree Commission which is rather a costly budget item.

The Green Team is a community minded citizens group that sets up clean up and helps educate the residents in a variety of environmental issues. They hold their meetings monthly and do clean ups usually 2-3 times a year. Very few people, other than the members, attend any of these meetings and events. Most people feel entitled to complain, yet do not show up to volunteer their time. It's the same people every time.

As far a recycling, most likely the Borough will be going back to dual stream pick up and special containers can be pricey. Few remember or fully utilize the Borough's recycling center.

You will see a lot of debris in the waterways and woods due to the excess of rain which has caused the wetlands to flood.

All are welcome to attend the clean-up scheduled for this weekend-Green Team will be meeting at Borough Hall for locations.

PAH answered that Harrington Park is a volunteer town-we have very few rateables, high school taxes, with such a small employee staff, he will discuss with the DPW to fit clean-ups into their schedule.

GE noted that many people put out their recycling too early which can cause it to blow around their neighborhood.

Alexandra Goodman-Laroche Avenue

Requested that the Property Maintenance Official ride around town on a regular basis and enforce the requests that were voiced tonight.

PAH thanked all who came out to the meeting to discuss their issues. They will be addressed as soon as possible.

ORDINANCE 2018-722

**BOROUGH OF HARRINGTON PARK
BERGEN COUNTY, NEW JERSEY**

**CALENDAR YEAR 2018 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED
THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE
AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK
(N.J.S.A. 40A-4-45.14)**

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Harrington Park in the County of Bergen finds its advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2018 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget of said year, amounting to \$50,004 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Harrington Park, in the County of Bergen, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2018 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Harrington Park shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$175,013, and that the CY 2018 municipal budget for the Borough of Harrington Park be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

**Addendum B
RESOLUTION 2018-72
Self Examination of Budget Resolution**

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-78b has authorized the Local Finance Board to adopt rules that permit municipalities in sound fiscal condition to assume the responsibility, normally granted to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, of conducting the annual budget examination, and

WHEREAS, N.J.A.C. 5:30-7 was adopted by the Local Finance Board on February 11, 1997, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.2 thru 7.5 the Borough of Harrington Park has been declared eligible to participate in the program by the Division of Local Government Services, and the Chief Financial Officer has determined that the local government meets the necessary conditions to participate in the program for the 2018 budget year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the governing body of the Borough of Harrington Park that in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.6a & 7.6b and based upon the Chief Financial Officer's certification, the governing body has found the budget has met the following requirements:

1. That with reference to the following items, the amounts have been calculated pursuant to law and appropriated as such in the budget.
 - a. Payment of interest and debt redemption charges
 - b. Deferred charges and statutory expenditures
 - c. Cash deficit of preceding year
 - d. Reserve for uncollected taxes
 - e. Other reserves and non-disbursement items
 - f. Any inclusions of amounts required for school purposes.
2. That the provisions relating to limitation on increases of appropriations pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2 and appropriations for exceptions to limits on appropriations found at 40A:4-45.3 et seq. are fully met. (Complies with the "CAP" law).
3. That the budget is in such form, arrangement, and content as required by the Local Budget Law and N.J.A.C. 5:30-4 and 5:30-5.
4. That pursuant to the Local Budget Law:
 - a. All estimates of revenue are reasonable, accurate, and correctly stated;
 - b. Items of appropriations are properly set forth
 - c. In itemization, form, arrangement, and content the budget will permit the exercise of the comptroller function within the municipality.
5. The budget and associated amendments have been introduced and publicly advertised in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Local Budget Law, except that failure to meet the deadlines of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 shall not prevent such certification.
6. That all other applicable statutory requirements have been fulfilled.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution will be forwarded to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services upon adoption

RESOLUTION 2018-78
TONNAGE GRANT

WHEREAS, the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act, P.L.1987, c.102., has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent and the spirit of the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act to use the tonnage grants to develop new municipal recycling programs and to continue and to expand existing programs, and

WHEREAS, The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection is promulgating recycling regulations to implement the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act; and

WHEREAS, the recycling regulations impose on municipalities certain requirements as a condition for applying for tonnage grants, including but not limited to, making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality; and

WHEREAS, a resolution authorizing this municipality to apply for the 2017 Recycling Tonnage Grant will memorialize the commitment of this municipality to recycling and to indicate the assent of the Mayor and Council to the efforts undertaken by the municipality and the requirements contained in the Recycling Act and recycling regulations; and

WHEREAS, such a resolution should designate the individual authorized to ensure the application is properly completed and timely filed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Harrington Park that the Borough of Harrington Park hereby endorses the submission of the recycling tonnage grant application to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and designates Mark Kiernan to ensure that the application is properly filed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the monies received from the recycling tonnage grant be deposited in a dedicated recycling trust fund to be used solely for the purposes of recycling.
