PAH stated that it is not the policy of the Mayor and Council to hold those who want to discuss something publically.

Mr. Will Walsh and son Kaden, Old Tappan New Jersey

Has coached many children in our town as part of the sports program. His son has questioned why he cannot participate in girls' softball. There are girls now participating in wrestling and basketball, alongside boys. Kaden read a letter into the record requesting consideration that he can play softball and that all should be able to play any sport, no matter what the gender.

PAH was impressed with how much knowledge Kaden had of his rights and freedoms. PAH continued that Harrington Park has always been an inclusive community.

Mr. Walsh has contacted several other towns and has also requested to see the by-laws of the softball association (of which he has not received).

Mr. Walsh is hoping that the Borough of Harrington Park will consider opening up softball to all genders, which would be the right thing to do. Recreation programs are not about just winning, they are about building confidence and showing group support of one another. Mr. Walsh reminded all that we are talking about 3rd and 4th graders. Old Tappan will allow him to play on the Old Tappan team but he is now waiting to hear from the other towns.

PAH concluded that the Council Liaison to the Recreation Commission was not present at this meeting, however, Councilwoman Chung will be brought up to speed to hold a discussion at the next Recreation Commission meeting.

Ronald Manic 180 Martha Road (until recently)

Lived at location for over 3 years and developed several health problems that he believes is due to the mold that developed in the house. He had the house tested and handed out the report for review. He had to throw out much of his belongings and move quickly into another location.

Discussion took place regarding the CCO process. JRD explained that the Borough has no idea when a rental unit changes occupants. It is up to the landlord and real estate agents to follow the rules for the Borough and apply for the CCO; the renter can apply as well. Mr. Manic stated that the landlord did not apply for a CCO. He is reporting these circumstances so this does not happen to future renters at this location.

JRD explained that the CCO covers only structural conditions, and he noted that he is not familiar with “mold issues” and would need additional information. He will make sure that Mr. Apa and Mr. Zavadino are aware of the problem at this location. It was suggested that as a tenant Mr. Manic should contact the courts in Hackensack.

Report submitted by Councilwoman Chung (JP read into record):**

HP BOE - HP school has replaced all the doors near the kindergarten wing (approx. 20 doors) to the new bullet proof doors. The school was able to purchase these doors at a very reasonable price point (approx. \$1500). The school is working on the other doors in the building as well.

Recreation Commission -

The Baseball/softball/t-ball registration has started and so far we have 175 students registered. I would like to thank Lara Toomin for building the website and for effectively running the campaigning to have families sign up. I would like to thank KJ for his hard work on collecting the checks and also communicating with updates.

Mike Rutigliano stepped down as the baseball commissioner. I would like to thank Mike for being the HP Baseball Commissioner for many years and his dedication for the sport will be always remembered and appreciated.

Peter Toomin is the new Baseball Commissioner. The Rec. commission organized a meeting with all the coaches on 3/7 and received a lot of positive feedback on merging the baseball/softball/t-ball to the Town. There were many needs addressed as well. The Rec. responded that they will be resolved one at a time and asked for patience.

Peter Toomin is taking an inventory of all the equipment for baseball and I would like to thank Ann Bistriz for her guidance and help. Peter also requested that the Borough should have a defibrillator available at the Highland Field.

Meeting is scheduled tomorrow to meet the Borough's new representative at Orange and Rockland and discussion is planned to address the resident's concerns.

Old Business

(ALB) Aerial Spraying for Mosquito Larvae-Motion of Approval

ALB explained that documentation provided by the county and reviewed by others has determined that this would be the best way to handle the mosquitos in the Swim Club and Highland Field areas. Board of Health has already reviewed and is requesting that residents in the area be informed prior to any applications. County was in agreement. Motion to approve was made by GE with a second by JP-AIF.

New Business

(PAH) Mayor's Report

Demolition is taking place at 200 Old Hook Road with the project to be completed in 18-24 months. This also involves the properties on Schraalenburgh Road, as well.

Borough has passed the resolution to be able to benefit from Federal Surplus equipment for possibly all departments as a recommendation from round table discussions with Senator Gottheimer

Thanked the Finance Committee and Kunjesh Trivedi for work on the budget which will have the same increase as last year -approximately \$70 per average household.

Borough earned the Silver Award (\$1000) for Safety from the Bergen Joint Insurance Fund. The BCLOM is endorsing Cyber Security programs for all municipalities. Mr. Trivedi will be working with IT company to ensure Borough is protected.

All residents can call Suez or go on line to mysuezwater.com to determine if their home is affected by the lead reports. ALB called about her property and found it to be a very positive experience and recommends all should do it.

Resolution Authorizing the Borough of Harrington Park through the Harrington Park Police Department to File an Application to Participate in the Federal 1033 Program to Enable Said Department to Request and Acquire Excess Department of Defense Equipment

WHEREAS, the United States Congress authorized the 1033 Program to make use of excess US Department of Defense equipment y making such equipment available to local, county and state levels of government; and,

WHEREAS, under the 1033 Program, law enforcement agencies may request resources, and the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) mandates that all acquired 1033 equipment be under the control of the requesting law enforcement agency who requests it; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 2364-1(a) recently enacted by the New Jersey Legislature as P.L. 2015 Chapter 23, requires that all local or county law enforcement agencies wanting to apply to the 1033 Program, be approved by Resolution by a majority of the full membership of the governing body of that jurisdiction and the said DLA requires that applications for Program participation be submitted every 365 days; and,

WHEREAS, the said Mayor and Council is aware that certain equipment available in the RTD system will not be approved by the New Jersey State Coordinator for the Program; these include bayonets, combat gloves and simulated rocket launchers; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough of Harrington Park Mayor and Council at its March 18, 2019 meeting reviewed this matter and is recommending it to the Harrington Park Police Department; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Harrington Park, County of Bergen, and State of New Jersey that it hereby authorizes the Harrington Park Police Department to participate in the Federal 1033 Program administered through the Law Enforcement Support Office (LES)) and that said Department may acquire any DEMIL A (non-controlled) property in the RTD system without restriction; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Mayor and Council finds that the Harrington Park Police Department may request and acquire certain DEMIL B through H (controlled) property in the RTD system and it has been determined that based on the needs of this venue, law enforcement may not acquire military vehicles or marine vessels over 28' without specific approval of the governing body; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any special application for weapons, aircraft, or MRAP's must be authorized by the governing body prior to the submission of the application and that these resources are not available in the RTD system and require special application; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Mayor and Council of the Borough of Harrington Park further requires that the designated LESO Point of Contact for this venue submit a monthly report regarding acquired 1033 Program property and in the event that any property had been obtained contrary to the intent of P.L. 2015 c23, the State Coordinator shall be contacted and equipment shall be transferred or returned via the federal inventory database system (FEPMIS); and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Board recognizes that the acquisition of 1033 Program property is time-sensitive as resources are allocated to all State based on time-stamp of requisition and in the event that a LESO Point of Contact requests an item in good faith and said item is determined to be contrary to the intent of this resolution, the LESO Point of Contact may cancel the request prior to the acquisition of the property, without being in violation of P.L. 2015 c.23.

THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE
AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK
(N.J.S.A. 40A-4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Harrington Park in the County of Bergen finds its advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2019 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 1.0% increase in the budget of said year, amounting to \$51,348 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Harrington Park, in the County of Bergen, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2019 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Harrington Park shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 1.0%, amounting to \$51,348, and that the CY 2019 municipal budget for the Borough of Harrington Park be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.
